PURPOSE

Human Powered Racing has requested use of Willows Park & Beach to host the Eliminator Triathlon on Sunday, July 19, 2015 (request attached).

BACKGROUND

This event was held in Oak Bay for the first time on August 24, 2014. That event date conflicted with the Tour de Victoria cycling race. Human Powered Racing started the event earlier in the day, and conflicts in road use were avoided. The attached proposal includes the new date of Sunday, July 19, 2015. The Commission should note that the MEC PaddleFest is scheduled to take place on their traditional date of Saturday, July 18, 2015, also at Willows Park.

Staff are not aware of any issues or complaints arising out of the 2014 Eliminator Triathlon.

ANALYSIS

The original request in 2014 was denied, given that Human Powered Racing is a commercial entity. However, once the Victoria Sexual Assault Centre became the benefit charity for the event, approval was granted. The same partnership is proposed for the 2015 event.

The Commission should give consideration to Willows Park hosting two special events on the same summer weekend.

RECOMMENDATION

- 1. THAT the Commission approve the use of Willows Park for the Oak Bay Eliminator Triathlon on July 19, 2015; and
- 2. THAT the event request be forwarded to Council to consider the additional required approvals.

Programs

<u>Aquatics</u>

- Four school swim teams are practicing on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday afternoons this month. Monterey Middle School, Willows Elementary, Glenlyon Norfolk Junior School and St. Michael's University are gearing up for the school swim meet coming up in February.
- Sir James Douglas Out of School Care is again participating in the public swim lessons. They have 9 new swimmers this season with a total of 30 students registered during the Tuesdays; 3-5pm swim lesson set.
- St. Patrick's and Glen Lyon Norfolk Schools began 8 weeks of School Board swimming lessons this month.
- Aquatics & Reception staff attended in-service training this month to review and practice one-guard emergency
 responses to spinal injuries, unconscious victims and drowning non swimmers in deep water. The lifeguarding
 team also practiced land spinals and key lifeguarding fitness skills.

<u>Fitness</u>

- The 2014 Merrython Fun Run raised \$3278 for the Rotary Club of Oak Bay.
- On New Year's Day there were a total of 294 patrons who used the Fitness Studio, 70 patrons who attended a Jazzercise class and 7 patrons who received fitness studio orientations.
- Recreation Oak Bay's Times Colonist Health Challenge participants are meeting with Personal Trainer Michele
 Guy once a week and are committed to accomplishing their goals.
- A new promotion in the gym has been introduced to help ensure all patrons are aware of gym etiquette guidelines while using the fitness equipment and facilities. Called "Are you onboard with Gym Etiquette?" patrons who participate are eligible to win BC Ferries tickets.
- Indoor Cycling classes have expanded to include a fusion class with Yoga Cycle on Wednesday evenings. The new class is full with 12 patrons enjoying an energizing cycle and relaxing stretch.

Community Recreation

- January was a busy month for the After School Program. Oak Bay Fun Factory once again received the Good Life
 Kids Multi Sport Grant and started a multisport program including rugby, soccer, Zumba and yoga. This program
 is always much appreciated by the families as it is during After School Care hours and is provided at no
 additional cost.
- The kindergarten children at Carnarvon Fun Factory have been enjoying newly implemented 'Swim Days' once a month at the pool.
- The After School Care Program registration for the 2015-16 school year will begin in February and we anticipate
 an excited group of registrants as the new school term means a new location at the Neighbourhood Learning
 Centre.
- The daycare program is back in full swing after the Christmas break with Kindergym trips and Kodaly Method of Music classes.
- This month the housekeeping area was transformed into a Winter Wonderland and the children are really enjoying it.
- Holiday camps were very successful again this year. The 3 day basketball camp was full and there were a lot of registrants in Skidaddle with several days of full registration. Hiring for Spring Break camp staff is now underway.

Program, Parks and Physical Plant Report January 2015 Parks and Recreation Commission Meeting February 2015

- The gym and bouncy castle birthdays have been very popular and fully booked throughout January. The theme birthday parties for this spring are being updated.
- With the wet weather many families are now taking advantage of the Family Gym time on Friday evenings and there has been an increase in attendance.

Monterey Centre

- Monterey members enjoyed a Robbie Burns Dinner Event on January 13th. Entertainment included a piper, toast to the haggis and a children's Scottish Country dance performance. The 136 attendees enjoyed the delicious roast beef meal and trifle dessert.
- The New Members Meet and Greet on January 19th was well attended. Participants enjoyed the speeches and power point about all the fun clubs, activities, trips, volunteer opportunities and events available to members. Monterey has 2,086 members to date.
- Monterey Centre proudly hosted a cross-generational jazz evening on January 31st featuring UJAM, Universal Jazz Advocates and Mentors Society, Monterey Centre's Concert band and local musician Louise Rose.
- Popular courses this winter include Line Dancing, Beginner Bridge lessons, languages, Beginner Ballet, Yin Yoga, Cooking with Chef Dan Hayes and Drawing 101.
- Upcoming trips include a Chinese Dinner downtown February 11th and a trip to Butterfly Gardens March 4th.

Arena / Teens / Indoor Sports Field

- The Indoor Sports Field was very busy in January with baseball, softball, soccer, lacrosse and rugby teams.
- Soccertron Academy is popular on Mondays and Wednesdays. Monday's classes have 18 to 20 children in all three classes for ages 3-6years. The Wednesday class is full with 24 children for ages 7-10 years.
- Learn to Skate numbers are strong on Saturdays and Mondays with 8 to 10 children in each class. There are 13 instructors on the ice teaching regular lessons and 3 to 4 instructors teaching private lessons.
- The Pacific Cup Tournament ran January 16th-18th and was very successful with approximately 20 games played over the weekend in the arena.
- Lunch drop in at the teen centre is showing consistent numbers in the 15-20 range.

Tennis

- The 35th New Year's Classic Tennis Tournament was a huge success with 241 players participating, which is up from 199 players in 2014. Thirty five events were run this year including new senior's categories for 35+ and 75+ age groups. These new events were offered to help players prepare for the Western Senior Nationals coming to Victoria in April. The highlight of the Classic was the first dinner and dance featuring the band *Rukus*. The event was held at Monterey Center and was sold out at 125 people.
- All Junior and Adult lesson and social programs started up January 19th. Of the 65 Adult and Junior programs offered, 59 are running. That equals 91% program response rate and involves 380 registrations.
- Tennis BC High Performance Camp is scheduled for Saturday, January 31st and Sunday, February 1st. Sixteen of the top Island junior / teen tennis players will be invited.

- Healthy, Happy, New Year's Day event started with a walk with Mayor and Council and was well attended with approximately 60 people enjoying the walk to the marina and back. A reception for community members and Council followed in the Sports View. Free activities on that day included skating, swimming, tennis and fitness assessments. Approximately 900 people took part in these activities.
- Friday, January 16th The Winter Concert Series began with a double bill with Niels Petersen, Connie Lebeau,
 Norm MacPherson, and Terry Brennan and Roger Plant. The event attracted over 90 people, many who were new not only to the concerts but to the centre as well.

Maintenance

- January has been a busy month with maintaining the building and ice during the Pacific Cup Hockey and New Year's Classic Tennis Tournaments.
- Engineered drawings have been approved for the installation of the new climbing wall which was installed on January 27th and will be unveiled at the Family Day Swim on Monday, February 9th.

Parks

- An estate donation in the amount \$50,000 was received for the Tree Donation Program.
- A new irrigation system has been installed along the walkway from Oak Bay Avenue to Monterey Recreation Centre. This will improve the overall plant health and will give the Parks Department an opportunity to plant summer annuals.

Program, Parks and Physical Plant Report January 2015 Parks and Recreation Commission Meeting February 2015

- The Green Team of Victoria will be helping out with invasive plant removal at Anderson Hill Park on Saturday, January 31st. This new group connects through social media to do volunteer work at various parks in the CRD. They will be lead by Christina Dean Johnson who is responsible for much of the Anderson Hill Park invasive plant removal.
- Helen Strohschien, one of our gardeners, will be giving a talk on summer annual selections to the Oak Bay Garden Club on February 18th at 2 pm.
- Tree planting and cyclical tree pruning is underway throughout the Municipality.
- Curb edging has begun along the taxed boulevards and garden beds continue to be weeded and mulched.

Tree Report

For the year 2014

Public Property

Parks staff removed fifty-two trees from public property. These trees were removed because they were dead, diseased, dying or structurally unsound. Seven of these trees were Garry Oaks.

Parks staff planted fifty-nine trees on public property. Public property includes boulevards, parks and other Municipal owned property. Twenty eight were protected species, of these, twenty-one were Garry Oaks.

Private Property

Two hundred and forty three permits were issued under the Tree Protection Bylaw. Ninety one removal permits were issued for the removal of one hundred and twelve trees protected under the Tree Protection Bylaw. These permits were issued because the trees were dead, diseased, dying or structurally unsound or removed for construction. Eighty two of these were protected species and thirty were of protected size. A total of seventeen replacement trees are required. One hundred and seventy eight permits were issued for pruning protected trees.

Security Deposit and Enforcement

Nine security deposits were received and none were refunded. None were forfeited due to non-compliance with conditions on deposits as required by the bylaw. The bylaw requires security deposits to ensure care of required replacement trees; deposits are held by the Municipality for 3 years pending satisfactory planting and care or required replacement trees. Forfeited deposits go to the Parks tree purchase account.

Bylaw enforcement staff issued two tickets this year for pruning without a permit.

Tree Work Orders for Park Staff

For this period, the Arboricultural crew handled six hundred and fifty three work orders related to tree protection and public tree maintenance throughout the Municipality.

Special projects this year included the removal of invasive species in Uplands Park, Knotweed control and Christmas light installation.
