PURPOSE

The Oak Bay Fire Fighters Charitable Foundation has submitted a request (see attached) to host a fundraising event at Willows Park on September 17, 2016. Commission and Council approval will be required in order for the event to take place.

BACKGROUND

The Oak Bay Fire Fighters Charitable Foundation (the Foundation) is proposing Sausage Fest, similar to Esquimalt's Rib Fest, which has become a popular annual event in that community. The event would be a fundraiser with proceeds going toward the purchase and installation of a new playground at Willows Elementary School.

Described as an outdoor family fun event, the proposal outlines plans for a beer garden, BBQ's cooking sausages for sale, live music, a bouncy castle and a dunk tank. Admission would be by donation, and the field portion of the park would be fenced so as to keep alcohol inside the park area.

ANALYSIS

The most important consideration would appear to be the inclusion of a beer garden as part of the event. In recent history, there does not appear to have been outdoor beer gardens in Oak Bay parks. More recent beer gardens have all been held in the Windsor Pavilion as part of sport tournaments. The Commission of the day did deny beer garden requests at Willows Park in 2007 and 2008, but the Commission and Council may feel that times have changed.

It would be a benefit to have Oak Bay Fire Fighters planning this event, as opposed to a private group or one with less connection to the community. Staff believe the accountability of the Foundation to the community would be significant.

Should the Commission approve use of the park for the event, approval for sales on site as well as for the live music would need to be obtained from Council, as per the Oak Bay Zoning Bylaw.

In addition, the event organizers would need to obtain a Special Occasion Licence (SOL) from the BC Liquor Control Board (BCLCB) for this event. This licence would require that a specific area with secured entry points be in place for the Beer Garden. This may be done with fencing or with a tent. No minors are permitted inside of this designated area. For events with 500 people or less local police can assist with a security plan. For events over 500 the organizers would need to consult with BCLCB for security plan approval.

OPTIONS

- Approve the request as submitted. The Commission would approve the use of the park and recommend approval for the on-site sales and music to Council. The Commission would want to consider whether the event is appropriate for Willows Park, and whether the approval for a beer garden would create additional requests in future. The issue of a precedent could be mitigated by the fact that this event will be managed in large part by Oak Bay staff.
- 2. Deny the request as submitted. No further action would be required.
- 3. Approve the request for use of Willows Park, but deny the beer garden portion of the request. This may result in the event being cancelled altogether.
- 4. Approve the event if it were to move to Windsor Park, with the beer garden to be held inside the Windsor Pavilion. This option would need to be discussed with a representative of the Foundation at the Commission meeting.

RECOMMENDATION

THAT the Parks, Recreation & Culture Commission consider the request from the Oak Bay Fire Fighters Charitable Foundation to hold Sausage Fest in Willows Park on September 17, 2016 and, if approved, recommend to Council to approve on site sales on food and beverages and live music as part of the event.

PURPOSE

Canada's 150th Anniversary of Confederation will occur in 2017. In November 2015, Council made a referral that directs Commission to review and provide recommendations on the District of Oak Bay's participation in the celebrations for this anniversary.

BACKGROUND

The Government of Canada is encouraging Canadians to create initiatives that will allow participation in local, regional, and national celebrations that in turn will contribute to building a sense of pride and attachment to Canada. To support this the Department of Canadian Heritage has established The Canada 150 Fund. This fund will provide resources to municipalities and other organizations to create opportunities to celebrate this anniversary.

ANALYSIS

Presently, the municipality provides two events on the day prior to Canada Day. One is the afternoon event on the lawn of the Municipal Hall named Celebrate Canada Day which provides a barbeque, children's activities and music. The second event is held in the evening and is the first concert in the Music in the Park series held at Willows Park. These events are held the day before Canada Day as the City of Victoria holds large regional activities on Canada Day itself which many Oak Bay residents enjoy.

For the anniversary a new event could be planned or one of the existing ones expanded. Staff believe that building on an existing event such as the concert which already draws a large audience would provide a truly memorable occasion. For example, the concert evening could be enhanced by additional entertainment, family activities and ending with a fireworks display over the water.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

The scope of the event will be determined by available funds made available through the Canada 150 Fund. If adding to an existing event the project would benefit from funds in the Culture operating budget as well.

RECOMMENDATION

THAT the Parks, Recreation & Culture Commission recommend that staff apply for a Canada 150 Grant to expand the concert at Willows Park to be held on June 30, 2017.

Programs

Culture

- The 13 art pieces for Arts Alive were installed in preparation of the opening event on June 2nd. Artists responded to a public call and selected pieces will be installed for one year. Each artist has been sponsored by a local business or community group. During the year, the community will vote for their favourite piece and the most popular work will be considered for possible purchase by the municipality. The other sculptures will be for sale for private residences or to be donated to Oak Bay.
- Four pianos are currently being painted by local artists and will return this summer for the public to play and enjoy.
 Artists Jonathan Gleed, Peter van Giesen, Dorothy Jarvis and Robert Amos have painted pop-up pianos that will be installed at Turkey Head, Loon Bay Park, Cattle Point and Estevan Village. Pianos may be played during the day and will be covered overnight.

Aquatics

- The Coast Capital Free Swim was held on Monday, May 9th with 101 swimmers in attendance.
- Thursday, May 19th was National Lifejacket Day. Aquatics posted facts and information about the importance of lifejackets in the viewing area and Buckles, the Canadian Red Cross Mascot, visited swimmers and lesson goers throughout the day.

Fitness

- The May Pass was on sale for \$25 as of April 1st. There were a total of 1043 passes sold that allow participants to use 16 recreation facilities in Greater Victoria. Pass holders can redeem the pass and receive \$25 off the cost of an Annual or Regional pass.
- First Open Heart Society is an organization that provides funding to help patrons that cannot afford the cost of the Take Heart program. A walk on Sunday June 5th has been organized as a fund raiser for the organization. The walk starts at Maria Montessori Academy around the University of Victoria.
- Free Yoga at Willows Beach is being offered July 5th- August 30th from 6-7pm. A great opportunity for the public to try yoga or continue their yoga practice at a beautiful outdoor venue with talented Oak Bay yoga instructors.

Community Recreation

- The new Friday Night Pickleball Social program started on May 15th with 15 people registered.
- Preschool Playhouse visited the Fire Hall this month and had a great time playing in the park and learning about the fire service.
- Registration for Summer Camps has begun and some of the most popular camps this year are the Art Camps,
 Creepers and Creations, Minecraft theme camp, Backstage Pass theatre camp, Enchanted Forest and Spy Vs Spy
 theme camps. There are many new exciting themes, a variety of different sports and nature camps that are
 sure to fill up soon.
- The Kids Can Ride Bike course ran on May 15th with 10 children registered.
- The golf course remains busy and welcomed back students from SMUS and the Monterey Seniors Group.
- The second set of spring golf lessons started with high numbers. Many students from the level 1 programs signed up for the next set in the progression.

Monterey Centre

- The Volunteer Recognition Wine and Appetizer event was held May 3rd. Acting Mayor Tara Ney kindly thanked and acknowledged the volunteers for their contributions. Milestone service volunteers were recognized with a certificate and pin. Attendees enjoyed the delicious appetizer buffet and wine poured by staff, management and the chair of the Oak Bay Parks, Recreation and Culture Commission.
- Qi Gong, Osteofit, Yoga, Zumba Gold, Nuline Dancing, Bridge Bidding Brush up and Tai Chi have been popular adult courses this spring.
- The Merry Widows Fashion Spring Fashion Show and Tea was held on May 3rd. The sellout crowd enjoyed seeing the spring fashions from Taylor Lynne Petites on Oak Bay Avenue and the models from the Merry Widows club.
- The Drama Club hosted a dinner theatre event on May 31st and presented their plays, "Yesterday" and "Temptation Sordid or Virtue Rewarded". The delicious dinner and entertaining performance was enjoyed by 112 patrons.
- May outings included; Eco Cruise of the Sidney harbour front May 26th, Kinsol Trestle and Unsworth Vineyards Winery May 28th.
- Upcoming June outings: Footloose in Chemainus, Duncan Farmers Market and Tugwell Creek Honey Farm and Meadery.

Arena / Teens / Indoor Sports Field

- For the second year, a set of Saturday morning Learn to Skate lessons for April to May have been offered. The
 registration is strong and has helped with the demand for skating lessons. Families are enjoying the option of
 skating year round.
- The 9th Annual YES Awards was held on Wednesday, May 5th and were a great success. There were 12 award recipients and 99 people in attendance for the event. The award recipients were from grade 6-10 and came from Lansdowne Middle School, Oak Bay High School, and Monterey Middle School.
- Applications were due May 9th for the 4th Summer Youth Internship program. Five interns have been selected for the program out of 15 quality applications. The program is designed to give youth aged 15-18 the opportunity to gain experience in the summer camp setting through four weeks of summer camp.
- There are 26 teams playing in the softball league this spring. They are using new fields for the second year as Oak Bay High fields cannot be used due to construction. Teams are looking forward to the yearend tournament on June 17-19th.

Sports View

The Sports View hosted numerous functions this month including an Oak Bay Teachers Meeting/Luncheon, Yes
Awards Banquet, Oak Bay Skaters Luncheon, Music Singing Event (private function), Oak Bay Volunteers AGM

- Rogers Junior Rookie Tournament was held on May 14th.

<u>Maintenance</u>

• A LED lighting upgrade has just been completed at the Oak Bay Recreation Centre. New exterior LED light fixtures have been installed along the fitness and pool walls, 7 new LED overhead lights in the catwalk area of the pool and all new LED lights in the fitness studio, fitness change rooms and the program fitness area.

Parks

- The flowering baskets have been installed along Oak Bay Ave, Estevan Ave, Kiwanis Tea House, Tomleys Market and Henderson and Oak Bay Recreation Centers.
- The bedding plants have arrived and the horticulture crew will begin planting them in the garden areas.
- Parks received \$6,885.00 from the BC Hydro/ Tree Canada re-greening fund to assist with tree purchases for 2016.
- The Rotary Club of Oak Bay has given the municipality \$6,000 dollars to assist with the marine kiosk panels and the purchase of two new bike racks. The bike racks will be located at the Midland entrance to Uplands Park and Cattle Point.
- Preparation is underway for the Oak Bay Tea Party on June 3rd, 4th, and 5th. Staff are working with Noreen Taylor and will attempt to make the Tea Party as close to a zero waste event as possible.
- All crews are busy with seasonal maintenance.

Tree Report

For the Month of May

Lady Bugs have now been fully released. We are still receiving complaints from some residents but are waiting for the predator populations to grow and start controlling the aphids. We have started removing a number of Birch trees that have been heavily damaged by Bronze Birch Borer. Three have been removed on Kinross, one on Florence and there will be two more on Woodhouse and at least three more on Florence. Four Garry oaks have been noticed this year that have not leafed out at all - one or two a year is usual, so four is high. Caterpillars and winter moth (the green inchworms) populations seem to be down a bit from past years.

Public Property

Parks staff removed ten trees from public property. These trees were removed because they were dead, diseased, dying or structurally unsound, damaging infrastructure or blown over in the wind. None of these trees were native trees. One donation Garry oak was planted at Cattle Point.

Private Property

Twenty five permits were issued under the Tree Protection Bylaw since the last report. Fifteen removal permits were issued for the removal of nineteen trees protected under the Tree Protection Bylaw. These permits were issued because the trees were dead, diseased, dying or structurally unsound or removed for construction. Thirteen of the trees were Garry oaks. Eight replacement trees are required. Fifteen permits were issued for pruning protected trees.

Security Deposit and Enforcement

Three security deposits were received and one was refunded. The bylaw requires security deposits to ensure care of required replacement trees; deposits are held by the Municipality for 3 years pending satisfactory planting and care or required replacement trees. Forfeited deposits go to the Parks tree purchase account. A \$1000 fine was issued for the removal of a protected tree on Wooton. A \$500 fine was issued for 2714 Lincoln for not following permit conditions.

Work Orders

This month we received 68 calls for service and completed 82.
