PURPOSE

At the meeting of April 6, 2016 the Commission held a discussion on the issue of dogs being off-leash at Windsor Park, and in parks in general. Through that discussion, the Commission directed staff to provide some additional information, which is attached to this report.

PURPOSE

At the meeting of April 6, 2016, the Commission approved the use of Willows Park for a Family Fun Fair, a fundraising event proposed by the Oak Bay High School with funds to support their Cops for Cancer initiative. The event was approved as requested for May 14, 2016. The school has since advised that it would like to move the date to Sunday, May 29, 2016. The purpose of this report is to confirm Commission approval for the date change.

BACKGROUND

The event also required the approval of Council, related to the commercial fundraising activity being proposed. Council provided that approval at their meeting of April 25, 2016.

The request to change the date was made once school officials realized that the original May 14, 2016 date conflicted with graduation ceremonies.

ANALYSIS

Willows Park is available on May 29, 2016. However, the Oak Bay Half Marathon is taking place on that date, with the race route including the stretch of Beach Drive in front of Willows Park. As the Half Marathon is to be finished by noon, Oak Bay High School have altered their plans to begin set up for their event at noon, thereby alleviating any concerns related to park access.

PURPOSE

Oak Bay High School has requested use of Willows Park for their annual Kids Fun Fair, which is a fundraising event associated with the School's Cops for Cancer fundraising initiative. The purpose of this report is to seek Commission approval for use of the park for the event on May 14, 2016.

BACKGROUND

Oak Bay High School's Leadership Program has run the Kids Fun Fair for the past several years. This year's request includes a change of date, from September to May 14, 2016. Willows Park is available, and there are no conflicting events noted on that date. In past years the event has been well run, with no concerns having been raised.

ANALYSIS

The event plans include fundraising activities such as admission by donation, paid activities and a bake sale. As per Section 5.1.4 of the Oak Bay Zoning Bylaw, approval for these fundraising activities must be granted by Council. Thus, a staff recommendation to that effect is included at the end of this report.

PURPOSE

BACKGROUND

The 2014 Oak Bay Official Community Plan recommended the updating of the Oak Bay Public Art Policy. The original Public Arts Policy was adopted in 1994. There are many areas of art acquisition not addressed in the original policy. Moving forward a clear policy is required on how public art is to be selected, purchased, maintained and if necessary decommissioned.

PURPOSE

The Oak Bay Arts Laureate recommends the purchase of the sculpture "Rebirth" which is currently installed at Entrance Park at Foul Bay Road and Oak Bay Avenue.

BACKGROUND

The Arts Laureate has implemented two successful summer Public Art installations throughout Oak Bay in 2014 and 2015. One piece, named "Rebirth" by artist David Hunwick, was installed at Entrance Park in 2015. The art work which represents two whale bones forming a heart has been extremely popular with the public. As such the artist agreed to leave it up for an extended loan period. That period is coming to an end.

ANALYSIS

The goal of the Public Art Program has been to install temporary art works while seeking funds to make permanent purchases. Rebirth has been a piece that is recommended for purchase should funds be available. In April 2016, the municipality received a \$10,000 donation from the Province of British Columbia for the purchase of a sculpture through Oak Bay's Public Art Fund. This fund now has the amount necessary for this purchase. The art work would remain in its current location.

FINANCIAL IMPACT

With the \$10,000 donation from the Province the Public Art Fund is now at \$35,000. Cost of the proposed art work is \$15,750 (including GST). Making this a permanent installment, with engineer approval, will cost \$1,500 for a total project cost of \$17,250. Purchase of the sculpture would leave \$17,750 remaining in the Public Art Fund. Therefore, the entire purchase and installation would not require any additional municipal funds.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. That the Parks, Recreation and Culture Commission approves the permanent location for the art work "Rebirth" at Entrance Park.
- 2. That the Parks, Recreation and Culture Commission recommends to Oak Bay Council the purchase and installation of the sculpture "Rebirth" with funds to come from the Public Art Fund.

Programs

Culture

- Planning is underway for Oak Bay Arts and Culture Week which will be celebrated August 6th to 14th. The Arts and Culture Programmer is taking the lead in gathering event information from the participating organizations and coordinating the marketing of the week.
- The expansion of the Home Studio Tours to include artists demonstrating their work at the Neighborhood Learning Centre was very successful. Over 100 people visited the exhibits each day.
- Public Works has been constructing bases for the new Public Art Installations. An additional art work has been added to be located in the Oak Bay Village bringing the total number of art pieces to 13.

Aquatics

- Recreation Oak Bay paired up with four BC Ambulance employees and twenty Paramedic students from the Justice Institute of BC on Thursday, April 21st to run through several emergency simulations in the pool, arena and surrounding areas. Six of Oak Bay's lifeguards participated as the patients in the simulations and were involved in all debriefs with the Paramedic students and their instructors. This is the sixth time we have worked with both agencies to run this joint training and it continues to be a fantastic learning opportunity for everyone involved.
- Ninety-five swimmers attended the Coast Capital Free Swim on Monday, April 4th from 6:30-8:30pm.

Fitness

- As part of the regular fitness equipment replacement process, Henderson Centre will be receiving Precor treadmills, upright bicycles, recumbent bicycles, Concept II model D rowers and a SciFit upper body erg. The installation date will be Tuesday, July 5th
- The Oak Bay Recreation Centre will be receiving Precor treadmills, upright bicycles, recumbent bicycles, stair climbers, AMT cross trainer, Keiser Spin Bicycles, Concept II model D rowers and a Concept II model E rower. The installation dates will be Wednesday, July 6th and Thursday, July 7th. The Ellipticals are a brand new design so they will be arriving later in August.
- The Women on Weights program has been a great success at its new additional location at Henderson Recreation
 Centre on Thursday evenings. This small group training program teaches patrons how to use the strength training
 equipment in the fitness studio with correct form and technique, while putting a beginners weight program
 together. This helps to bring more patrons up to the Henderson Fitness Studio during quieter times.

Community Recreation

- The Afterschool program registration for Fall 2016 is now full at both locations and has a waitlist for both Willows Elementary and Campus View Elementary.
- Add-on Skating lessons have finished for the season with an average of 25 children attending from the Afterschool Program.
- The Daycare children were busy with Kindergym, music classes, yoga and walks to Carnarvon Park and Bowker Creek. A staff member brought in a lizard from their backyard and the children loved it! The Daycare celebrated Earth Week by learning how to recycle & reduce their garbage and with a field trip to Swan Lake.
- Pickleball Social on Friday nights is a new registered program starting in May and will have sessions running throughout the summer. It will give Pickleball players an opportunity to guarantee a spot to play on Friday nights at Henderson Centre from 6pm-8pm.

- The Nature Nuts program for 2-5year olds was full this session. The preschoolers and their parents decorated pots and planted their own sunflower seeds that will grow in the next few weeks. The next session starts at the end of May.
- The first set of golf lessons started April 6th and the registration has doubled from last year. It is great to see so many young new players learning the sport. Golf lessons for the Campus View Afterschool Program at Henderson will begin in May.

Monterey Centre

- The Monterey Note-Ables 20th Spring Show was held April 2nd and 3rd. Audiences enjoyed the uplifting musical and dance performances by talented Monterey Members. Pat Chung was recognized with a certificate and flowers from the Oak Bay Seniors Activity Association for proving leadership to the Note-Ables Club for 20 years. Ted Powell was also recognized for being a performer for 20 years.
- The Good Health Committee hosted four free talks including; Digestion and Stress by Inspire Health, Using BC Transit, Healthy Aging by Ministry of Health and the Top Scams of 2016 by the Better Business Bureau.
- Members and Guests enjoyed a farewell trip to the Bengal Lounge on April 14th and a trip to the Sea Cidery on April 23rd.
- The Community Volunteer Income Tax program has been well utilized by Monterey Members.

Arena / Teens / Indoor Sports Field

- Soccertron spring programs for 3-6yr olds are busy with most classes full with waitlists. The 7-10yrs class had high numbers with 19 registered.
- Novice Hockey League Spring Kids (5-14yrs) hockey game days are popular with 26 registered in the April session, and 14 so far for the May set. The sessions include a fun focused scrimmage for kids of all skills and abilities.
- Spring Learn to Skate lessons, being offered for the second year, are popular with all 11 levels running during the Saturday morning session.
- Lunch drop-in at the Youth Centre is showing consistent numbers in the 35-40 range.
- The Adult Mixed Softball League started up the first week of April with 26 teams, 2 more than last season. Sunny spring weather has made for a great start to the season, and the program is enjoying the benefits of the Joint Use Agreement for the use of the school district ball fields.

Sports View

- Meetings in April included Bays United coaches, Oak Bay Softball League coaches, Victoria Ultimate Frisbee Players Society AGM, Victoria Virtual Tennis, Kids for Tennis and Oak Bay Fire Department training.
- There have been soccer/hockey wind up parties for Oak Bay Teams, Beacon Hill Little League and other areas. Recreation Oak Bay is well known in the sports communities as a great place to use either the pool or turf for a wind up celebration and then come up to Sports View for food and drinks.
- Music Nights continue to do well, with three events scheduled in April.
- An Oak Bay Fire Department dinner and The Society of Engineers luncheon were two large functions held.

Tennis

- Henderson and Carnarvon tennis courts were power washed for the summer season.
- Outdoor block bookings are up 83% from last year as the ability to book multiple courts was made available to patrons.
- Oak Bay High School PE classes are back in the tennis bubble until May 31st.
- The High School Tennis League is utilizing the Henderson tennis courts.
- South Island Tennis League, community league play, is using Henderson, Carnarvon and Windsor courts.
- Pickle ball lines for 4 new courts are now painted on tennis court #1 at Carnarvon.
- Blocking bookings for Pickleball are estimated to generate \$2000, which will cover the cost of start-up.

Maintenance

- A new air purifying filter is being installed in the Monterey Woodcrafters shop. The filter, purchased by the Seniors Association and installed by the department electrician, should improve the air quality and safety for the carvers and woodworkers.
- Work was completed on the Goldsmith entrance/exit doors at the Recreation Centre this past month. Through
 the ingenuity of a couple of the Maintenance staff, a recycled Auto door closer that was saved from the 2013
 Henderson renovation was cut down and modified to fit the much narrower set of doors at the end of the
 Indoor Sports Field hallway.
- Preparation work is underway for the 3 week arena shutdown in June.

Parks

- The Rotary Club of Oak Bay, along with some Parks Staff, will be painting the Rotary Water Park on the first or second Saturday of May, weather permitting. The water park opens on the May long weekend.
- Summer annuals and hanging baskets will soon be arriving.
- Spring/Summer baseball is now in full swing.
- Parks staff are busy with field, boulevard, garden bed, golf course and tree maintenance.

Tree Report

For the Month of April

With the early start to the growing season has come an early start to aphid season. Aphids produce the sticky honeydew people complain about on their cars and sidewalks. We have sprayed Trounce to control the aphids on some trees to reduce complaints in the past. We are increasing our biological controls this year with lady bugs and the addition of Aphidoletes. Aphidoletes are a tiny flies that lay their eggs in aphid colonies and the larva eat aphids. They are released in small numbers and spread out as they reproduce so they take a while to make an impact. If we feel they are effective in the areas we have released them, we may use more in the future.

Public Property

Parks staff removed three trees from public property. These trees were removed because they were dead, diseased, dying or structurally unsound, damaging infrastructure or blown over in the wind. None of these trees were native trees.

Private Property

Twenty eight permits were issued under the Tree Protection Bylaw since the last report. Eleven removal permits were issued for the removal of eleven trees protected under the Tree Protection Bylaw. These permits were issued because the trees were dead, diseased, dying or structurally unsound or removed for construction. Six of the trees were Garry oaks. No replacement trees are required. Sixteen permits were issued for pruning protected trees. Four removal requests were denied, one was issued a permit to prune.

Security Deposit and Enforcement

No security deposits were received and none were refunded. The bylaw requires security deposits to ensure care of required replacement trees; deposits are held by the Municipality for 3 years pending satisfactory planting and care or required replacement trees. Forfeited deposits go to the Parks tree purchase account.

Parks staff is currently writing tickets under the Tree Protection Bylaw as there is no Bylaw Officer at this time.

Work Orders

This month we received 75 calls for service and completed 84 work orders.
